

OUR MISSION

Our mission is to offer children who have lost their limbs in traumatic accidents or suffer from congenital disabilities the physical capabilities to access the opportunities and self-esteem earned through education, work and mobility.



ABOUT ALTSO

ALTSO provides free prosthetic limbs, corrective surgery, orthotic devices and rehabilitative care to children who have lost limbs in traumatic accidents or suffer from congenital limb disabilities.

To maximize our reach and serve the neediest populations, we implement programs in local hospitals and clinics ("Program Partners" or "Implementing Partners") that have solid track records in providing pediatric orthopedic care.

We work in countries where there is a staggering need for orthopedic treatment due to landmines, violence, and most simply – poverty.

Our Program Partners match our support by funding administrative and overhead expenses – like staff salaries and utilities – allowing 100% of our program funds to be used on patient treatments – which means more children helped per every donor dollar expended.

PROGRAM PARTNERS

After working with our partners to determine how ALTSO's funding can treat the highest number of patients in a program year (January I – December 31), budgets for each program are created. Funding is then disbursed in 3 equal installments through the term of the partnership upon the partner's compliance with reporting requirements. Our partners agree to use this money only for treatment costs, and never for administrative expenses; this means 100% of ALTSO's program allocation is used to manufacture prosthetic and orthotic devices, purchase surgical materials, provide treatment and rehabilitation to patients, and to provide training to local healthcare providers to create sustainable programs for years to come.

Our Program Partners submit patient intake forms ("PIF's") on a monthly basis for every child who is evaluated and treated under our program. PIF's include patient history, diagnosis, treatment provided, cost of treatment and devices, follow-up requirements and before-and-after treatment photos in additional to other relevant data. Program results and patient data are then recorded into ALTSO's patient database for analysis. Quarterly progress and financial reports are cross-checked with the patient database so that trends can be analyzed to better understand the need in ALTSO's program countries.

Such thorough and transparent program partnerships help increase our programs' effectiveness and ultimately maximize the number of children treated.


WHY WE WORK THROUGH PARTNERS




In 2012, we provided **1,470** children in 12 developing countries with free orthopedic devices, treatments and rehabilitation. Here's where our services were needed:

WHY ASIA?

Asia is home to over 50% of the world's population, making it the most populated continent on earth. Due to its sheer size and amount of poverty, we direct most of our attention, services and fundraising focus to our programs throughout Asia.

Since 2013, we've funded more pediatric orthopedic treatments in Asia than any other geographic region. Asia makes up more than 75% of services provided by ALTSO and is by far our most concentrated investment.
